



From a summary of the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child, articles especially relevant to conflict and violence

Article Ó

Every child has the right to life. Governments must do all they can to ensure that children survive and develop to their full potential.

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Article 19

Governments must do all they can to ensure that children are protected from all forms of violence, abuse, neglect and bad treatment by their parents or anyone else who looks after them. Every child has the right to a standard of living that is good enough to meet their physical and social needs and support their development. Governments must help families who cannot afford to provide this.



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Child's letter to Margaretta D'Arcy This letter is one example of schoolchildren's Scoil Eoin. expressions of solidarity with Margaretta D'Arcy in 2014. She had been recently Tubber Road, imprisoned for walking on the runway at Gort Shannon Airport in early 2012 as part of Co. Galway. nonviolent protests against the Irish government's acceptance of USA military use of Shannon Airport, in breach of Irish neutrality. 11thFebruary 2014 Dear Margaretta, How are you doing there . My name is Oliwier and I saw you on the computer. My techer told me about you. I tink that you are a great person. I believe that war a terrible thing. We have heard about our human rights. I know that everybody is born free. We have the right to say what ever we want. I dont think that you should be in prison because you were only saying what you think. We hope that you are going to go home soon. Your sincerely, Oliwier (Age 9) DEPPEED

•This letter emerged from activities associated with Amnesty International Friendship Week which happened to coincide with the theme of persuasive writing for creative writing lessons. Scoil Eoin/Gort National School is multicultural and the teacher, Mary Mellick, felt that it is important to recognise that diversity is to be valued and that tolerance is vital in the world we live in today; she was handed a postcard in Galway to send to Dail Éireann highlighting the situation in Shannon Airport. When shown to the class, one of the children suggested writiing to Margaretta D'Arcy. "It really demonstrated to me the uncomplicated view that children have of the world, their understanding of fairness and their willingness to show tolerance. If I remember correctly they even sent her a friendship band! They really engaged with the activity and the simplicity of their words was very moving..."

From NNRTE with Ryan Curtis •These letters came out of discussions in 1st year RE class at Beneavin de la Salle College, Finglas, Dublin around the topic of Christian nonviolence and its obligations on Christians today to engage in nonviolent resistance to every form of evil in the world. After looking briefly at the action by five people who put a US Navy warplane out of action in Shannon Airport in 2003, the class went on to look at the example of Margaretta D'Arcy who had recently been imprisoned for protesting at the US army's continued use of Shannon Airport. The teacher, Mairin MacMaolain, reports that "The whole class was engaged with writing solidarity letters, horrifed with the reality that peacemakers were the ones being imprisoned while the war-makers were free to bring death and destruction anywhere they wished with the help of the Irish State."

Return of the exiles

This arpillera shows a joyful reunion of family members who were forced into exile during the Pinochet dictatorship in Chile. It was made immediately after the regime ended. Most of the exiles had been taken in by Sweden, Argentina, Canada, France and Germany. Making it possible to return after exile is an emotional and relevant part of dealing with the past, be that Chile, Northern Ireland or any other country in the world. Article 14 of the International Declaration of Human rights says "Everyone has the right to seek and to enjoy in other countries asylum from persecution".
