## "TO THE LIGHTHOUSE an interpretation in stitch

**To the Lighthouse** by Virginia Woolf is my favourite book written by my favourite author and I had no hesitation in choosing it for my self expression pieces for the City and Guilds Level 4 textile course.

I have named my two wall hangings after the title and the first chapter of the book - 'To the Lighthouse' and 'The Window'. The three panels, made for a screen, and the ottoman cover use techniques and embellishments including, trapunto, appliqué, printing on calico, many folded techniques, hand quilting, applying buttons, beads and ribbons, that I think represent the sea and family holidays spent on the coast.



I love using calico in my work - in its natural form it is a deep cream colour and rough to the touch but once it has been boil washed it is the most beautiful, hard wearing, soft to feel, material you can work with. Quilts are normally functional, being things of warmth they are placed on beds; I have used mine as decorations. Quilting is a creative art and very personal, it is also very therapeutic and is an activity that is ordered and creative with a goal of making something pleasing to the eye. During the making of my pieces I could imagine seeing the light casting shadows in the room and hearing the sea crashing round the rocks and Mrs. Ramsay promising her son a trip to the lighthouse.
