Personal message from Hr. Liam Cosgrave, T.D. to the Rt. Hon. Edward Heath, M.P. :

Thank you for your message of today's data. The date - December 6th - is acceptable.

I note what you say about sponsorship, and agree that the parties in Northern Ireland can simply be notified of the date and venue. This can be done by both of us.

On the question of chairmanship I feel you will appreciate on reflection that, in the context of the history of these islands, a settlement reached both on British soil and also under British chairmanship would on that account be likely to give rise to more criticism and controversy than either of us would desire.

Quite spart from the fact that this Conference is clearly <u>ful generic</u> - designed, hopefully, to produce an evolutionary solution to the Northern Ireland problem more than fifty years after the last such negotiation, and attended by the three power-sharing parties in Northern Ireland as well as by the two sovereign Governments of these islands - cur action a month ago in raising the questions of sponsorship and chairmanship at the same time as we reacted positively to the suggestion of a location in Britain, ands it clear that we did not feel that the host country could provide the chairmanship on this eccasion. Had there been any question of linking the two, our view of the venue would have been different.

We propose that a European statesman from the Community of which we are both members be invited to chair this meeting. We suggest Gaston Thorn, Foreign Minister of Luxembourg, whose qualities are known to both of us, and who we would hope might accept this invitation.
