

Former Royal Ulster Constabulary (RUC) officers who are due to give evidence in the inquiry into the murder of Robert Hamill have won a ruling allowing them to retain their annonymity.



A High Court judge in Belfast upheld an application for a judicial review by a former officer, known only by the letter L, on behalf of 20 retired police colleagues who have been called as witnesses.

Mr Hamill was beaten to death by a loyalist mob in Portadown, County Armagh, in 1997.
