Thousands attend homecoming march

A homecoming parade for soldiers returning from Afghanistan and Iraq has passed off largely peacefully in Belfast city centre.

Police kept rival loyalist and republican groups apart as a Sinn Fein protest against the soldiers' parade reached Howard Street.

A massive security operation was launched from early on Sunday morning, with police setting up checkpoints on the main routes into and out of the city.

A dissident republican march from the west of the city was prevented from going ahead by police.

Organisers had not received permission from the Parades Commission.

The soldiers then attended a reception at the Waterfront Hall, before making their way to a church service at St. Anne's Cathedral.

• **Disturbance:** A number of large fireworks were thrown by Loyalists as Republican demonstrators stood waiting for the parade. Police in riot gear kept the two groups apart. Liam Creagh reports.



Fireworks were also thrown at police in Royal Avenue and York Street and a car was damaged on the Westlink after a firework was thrown on to the carriageway.

A police officer was injured after a can was thrown in Fisherwick Place.

Police were also attacked with stones at the bottom of Divis Street.


im glad are british soldiers got the welcome home they deservered, its the Queens highway so they had to march
