RUC memorial window unveiled

Hundreds of people gathered at St Anne's Cathedral in Belfast on Sunday for the dedication of an RUC memorial window by Archbishop Robin Eames.

The Duke and Duchess of Abercorn, the Secretary of State Shaun Woodward and representatives of the four main churches, were among those attending.

The window illistrates a biblical scene with an image of Jesus with crosses at his feet to represent the 312 serving and 20 retired officers who were killed through terrorism in the RUC`s 80-year existence from 1922-2001.

The Dean of the Cathedral, Reverend Dr. Houston McKelvey, gave the address:

"This memorial is about pilgrimage and prayer where we continue to pray for peace.

There are a lot of people here today who have lost loved ones and know suffering up close and personal."
