Artists call for family stories of collusion for new mural

A huge mural depicting collusion between loyalist paramilitaries and British state forces is to be painted on Beechmount Avenue.

A wall has already been set aside for the mural, which is expected to be 48-feet long and eight-feet high.

Artists working on the painting say they want to hear from families who have been affected by collusion in order to record their thoughts on the wall.

Complex issue

"We are currently in possession of a lot of material for the wall, but the issue of collusion is so vast we don't have all the material we require," said the Mid-Falls Commemoration Committee's Paul Murphy.

"The wall will start out with a percentage of the information, and as the days and weeks go by we will add all information given to us to the wall.

"The scale of collusion is enormous, and by erecting this information wall we hope to play our part by informing visitors coming through our community of the issues still to be addressed by the British government, and shining a light on the murder by proxy policy that went straight to the heart of government at 10 Downing Street," he added.
