

He said if there was to be any legacy for Mr Quinn, the IRA should be abolished.

"What concerns me, having met many people from that locality, is that the structure still exists whereby if people want to speak out or if they feel intimidated they are likely to be beaten up and bullied," he said.

The Fine Gael leader made his remarks after a Dail debate on Mr Quinn's murder, attended by the Quinn family and Dominic Bradley of the SDLP. Labour's Liz McManus yesterday said she had no doubt members of the IRA carried out the attack.

Speaking after the debate, Mr Quinn's father Stephen Quinn claimed that if Sinn Fein was so confident about the identities of those not involved in the murder, then they should be able to clarify who was involved. He further called on Sinn Fein to join other parties in conclusively stating that his son was not a criminal.
