This series of four workshops, facilitated by Conflict Textiles curator Roberta Bacic and Annie McKay (Conflict Textiles) and Rachel Archibald (Causeway Coast and Glens Museum Service), was commissioned by the <u>Binevenagh and</u> <u>Coastal Lowlands Landscape Partnership</u> Scheme as the second phase of 'The Workhouse Through the Times' project. Eleven children from Limavady Community Development Initiative (LCDI) Afterschool Club took part in the workshops where they learnt about the experience of children who lived in the workhouse in the 19th century – their living conditions, food, work and clothing. Each child then created a small textile by embroidering their initials on off-cuts of linen. To complete the initiative, each different small textile will be brought together into a final textile art piece which will be unveiled in Limavady Community Development Initiative in Dec 2022.






