After a presentation of my textile work and textiles from other collaborative projects such as Bordando por la Memoria, Stitch for Change, and Arpillerando el Exilio. I showed two embroidery stitches that are used in arpilleras and we referred to the arpillera Queremos Democracia / We want democracy as a starting point to make their arpillera.

The workshop was well attended with around 25 participants from different backgrounds, including academic, activist, and creative. Some participants brought objects that told a story of solidarity, like the Mexican bandana; 'Paliacates' worn by the Zapatistas. Someone brought a quilt they had made to question higher education creatively. And another participant brought a badge that had 'Queers for Palestine' written on it.

Toward the end of the workshop, we fed back on each solidarity story and ways we can show

solidarity especially when there is censorship. Many of the workshop participants decided to make arpilleras that linked to Palestine.

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
