

LA VIDA QUE SE TEJE /LIFE THAT WE SEW Final report, 30th December 2016

It is empowering to be able to write this report looking at the achieved goals the project had from its start. This is what it set out to do at the time we planned the exhibition and associated activities.

Long term the aim is to establish in public spaces a series of textile narratives which have aesthetic, ethical and political strength. It is anticipated that their manner of display will foster dialogue and increase the strength of the textile narrative offering a common space for collectives of sewers, not only made at local and national levels, but also in other parts of Latin America. Ultimately we want to strengthen the National Network of Sewers of Life and memory. An invitation has been extended to groups around the country to participate in the making of small arpilleras that will make up an overall piece which will be used on International Human Rights day (10th December, 2016) to state publicly in Bogota their demands of Peace, Justice and Reparation.

It is relevant to acknowledge the steady, persistent, dedicated and solid work done by all stakeholders and also highlight the interconnectedness amongst them. The involvement went beyond the 4 partners who set the tone. It is also very significant that different actors from society have joined. Their voices have been validated and their claims made visible.

The exhibition time was extended and it went from 11th May until 10th July 2016. It had very good attendance and several associated activities took place while it was on and continued after that.

Life that We Sew included 85 pieces in total, being 20 from *Conflict Textiles* which brought in the Latin American dimension. From a curatorial point of view, Chilean arpilleras were at the core and incorporated other narratives of conflict from the region.

As planned in advance the exhibited pieces were looked after from the time the exhibit finished until collection by Museo de Antioquia's textile storehouse. On the 1st of December the curator collected the pieces and a professional condition report was signed by the registrar, director of the museum, academic Isabel Gonzalez and myself after carefully looking at each piece and then packed away ready to travel back to Northern Ireland.

In addition to this fundamental and necessary administrative activity a public seminar and discussion took place at Universidad de Antioquia on the 1st December from 2 to 5 PM. The topic: *PRESERVACIÓN Y USO DE TEJIDOS*TESTIMONIALES CON FINES EXPOSITIVOS Y DE MEMORIA/


