

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Crafted, powerful, vocal – *Stitched Voices*, launching on 25 March, is a new and exclusive exhibition of conflict and protest textiles at Aberystwyth Arts Centre in partnership with Conflict Textiles and the Department of International Politics at Aberystwyth University. Resistance against injustice and oppression, and remembrance of the dead and disappeared in violent conflicts and dictatorships, are the main themes of the *arpilleras* (three-dimensional textiles), embroidered handkerchiefs and sewn protest banners shown in Gallery 1. Crafted in different parts of the world, the collection includes protest and solidarity banners from Wales, *arpilleras* against torture and dictatorship from Chile, embroidered handkerchiefs remembering the dead and disappeared in Mexico's current situation of violence and impunity, and textile engagements with the 'Troubles' in Northern Ireland.

The curator of *Stitched Voices*, Roberta Bacic, a lecturer, researcher and human rights advocate, says:

"Using painstaking textile language in arpilleras and quilts, **Stitched Voices** of testimony, resistance, memory and resilience converge in this exhibition to bear witness of conflicts and human rights' abuses in different parts of the world."

Welsh voices of activism and solidarity are represented in the form of protest banners against Apartheid in South Africa, made by the Aberystwyth Anti-Apartheid Group in the 1980s, and against technology in contemporary warfare, sewn by peace activists Thalia and Ian Campbell. The wall hanging "Continuum" by Eileen Harrisson, a PhD student at Aberystwyth's School of Art, deals with personal and family experiences during the 'Troubles' in Belfast and in connection to the two World Wars.

The exhibition is commissioned by a team of researchers at the Department of International Politics, who want to promote crafts as archives of often-marginalized voices. Dr Berit Bliesemann de Guevara, a Reader in Peacebuilding, comments:

"In academia, there is little space for textiles or crafts. It's all about written text, documents, reports. Yet seeing **Stitched Voices**, you cannot but realise the power of marginalised voices. These textiles and the stories they tell help us understand politics as everyday experience."

The colourful and expressive exhibition of conflict and protest textiles is accompanied by an events programme that includes textile workshops, solidarity embroidering, lectures, roundtable discussions, and music and poetry sessions. The Wales One World film festival, , starting on 24 March, has dedicated one stream of films – 'Voices of Resistance' – to issues raised in the textiles. A related exhibition, "Footprints of Memory", takes place at Arthouse/Ty Celf Aberystwyth from 3–8 April.
