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# MORE SECURITY !

WHY DID THE COATES STREET DISASTER OCCUR? WHY DID MORE HOUSES HAVE TO BURN? IS IT BECAUSE THE SOLDIERS IN THE AREA ARE NOT COMPETENT, OR ARE NOT SYMPATHETIC? FAR FROM IT, THE PROBLEM IS THAT THEIR COMMANDERS HAVE TO RETAIN AN UNEASY RELATIONSHIP WITH THE UNIONIST GOVERN-MENT AND IN PARTICULAR WITH THE R.U.C. TOO OFTEN THE DESPERATE DESIRE OF THE ARMY IS TO PLEASE EVERYONE. THIS MEANS HESITATION. AND ON SATURDAY NIGHT HESITATION MEANT THAT COATES STREET BURNED.

For the moment, as before, the barricades are the best protection. Before they come down people will have to be assured that more soldiers are immediately available in an emergency, and more important that every alarm be treated as a potential emergency. It is all very well for Army commanders to thank the B - Men on the Shankill. Those commanders should realise that the greatest threat to the army is a potential right-wing fascist rising.

For all the army public relations, and Chichester-Clark's pledges of loyalty to the orange order Paisley still got his IO,000 to Stormont (B.B.C. figures were clearly inninaccurate).

Significantly the Coates Street attack came after Craig's U.D.I. meeting at the Ulster Hall. Equally significantly Craig spoke of guns to restore law and order in the aftermath of the Coates Street fighting which he himself had provoked.

#### **CRAIG; GUNS FOR PEACE**

Speaking to Newtonbreda Young Unionists Craig said; "whatever Who are the men with Craig? They are the medium size farmers, the small businessmen, the second rate gentry. Men desperately anxious to retain, indeed increase the political power that they have. They would let the working men of Ulster slaughter each other to gain these ends.

He has powerful forces behind him. The Rev. Martin Smyth was on his platform in the Ulster Hall. Smyth was author of the official Orange publication on the disturbances in Belfast, a pamphlet which amongst other things explained how catholics had burned their homes. Smyth is the Deputy Grand Master of the Belfast District of the Orange Order.

To illustrate another element in the alliance the Newsletter devoted an editorial last week to praise of Smyth and his pamphlet. The Newsletter, which has always played a most irresponsible role in periods of rioting in Belfast, is preparing to jump with Craig.

## BARRICADES

On the day the barricades went up again, the Telegraph, the B.B.C. and other news media all carried pictures showing new barricades. How said it is that they chose the magnificent Grosvenor Place barricade which has never come down, and indeed has steadily grown throughout its existence. Carefully tended by a group known as the Dirty Dozen plus one this barricade is now at least 20ft. thick, I5ft. high and contains an unknown number of cars. It is rumoured that a republic of Grosvenor Place is likely to be declared any day.

### FREE CITIZEN

We stand for full and equal rights for all citizens. Every family has the right to a house; everyone has the right to work. Nobody should be subject to arbitrary imprisonment.

The Stormont regime have deliberately stirred up sectarian hatred to try and avoid granting equal rights. From October 5th. last year when Craig ordered his police to use violence against marchers in Derry, the R.U.C. has been used again and again as a political instrument to ban and baton protests. The final episode in this grisly saga came when Chichester-Clarke ordered armed B-Men into the streets to kill, only six weeks ago.

The Unionist junta are not fit to govern, they have allowed Paisleyism and U.V.F. fascism to grow unchecked, and these monsters are now terrorising Catholic workers and all those protestants who dare to speak out against sectarianism. We offer our full support to all those defending the houses and lives under attack in Belfast.

Unlike in the I92O's the British government has this time used its troops in an attempt to stop sectarian massacres. The presence of troops will not be of any use unless basic grievances are resolved. This means the appalling problems of unemployment and bad housing. <u>BUT</u> Northern Ireland's economic problems cannot be solved so long as British capital can exploit the low wages and unemployment here -- so long as we are the surplus labour pool for the British economy.

The connection between the 26 Counties and British capital is also one of exploitation. Trade concessions are offered to British industrialists by the Tory Fianna Fail government while Irish workers are forced to emigrate, and while the Dublin unemployed live in slums. We especially condemn the Green Tory politicians who see nothing wrong in the 26 - Counties. They are unaware, or could not care that Ireland North and South today forms the second largest market in the world for British goods. Those who are serious about opposing Unionism in Northern Ireland must oppose Toryism in the 26-Counties since both are based on the connection with British Capital. We must break this connection. We stand for the Worker's Republic.

NOW IN BELFAST VICK HAS KNUCKLED UNDER IN THE FACE OF EXTREMIST PRESSURE. WE BELIEVE THAT EVERY CONCESSION MADE TO FASCISTS IS A BLOW AGAINST THE COMMUNITY. THIS BAN IS OBNOXIOUS FOR THAT REASON. 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We should not be suprised that the first reaction of the Queen's authorities to trouble in the City, is to ban contact with the outside world. For fifty years the University has ignored the City in which it exists, it has played safe, its academic life has in the main been a poor imitation of English University life, many of its dons are English and merely see Queens as a stepping stone in the rat race to higher things in the English University system, only in the field of mending bones, the faculty of Medicine, has the University distinguished itself.

Academic studies at Queens have ignored the situation in Ulster. Research has flourished in the field of laser beams, or the coinage of the Minoan civilisation. Meanwhile social and historical and cultural studies of Northern Ireland have been almost totally neglected. The truth is such studies would have revealed the repressive nature of the Unionist State; Queens would not have been given so many nice new buildings.

The University should enlighten and criticise the community in which it exists. Queens academics have never done much needed research into sociology in Northern Ireland. What has Queens produced on the Orange Lodges? The recent history of Northern Ireland? The ghetto system? The working of local government? The influence of sectarianism on culture? The real economic relationship between Northern Ireland and Britain? Can Queen's really still pretend with Ulster in the state it is now, that it has no business to get involved, that all it must do is churn out another generation of mindless Civil Servants. <u>BUT</u> the senate want more buildings. If they all went up in smoke tomorrow, at least it would mean one thing, Queens would have to go to the town, and play a real part in it.

NEIL BLANEY, WHO WITH HIS EYE ON THE OFFICE OF TAOISEACH OFFERED THEM A SUBSTANTIAL SUM OF MONEY TO SET UP AN OFFICE IN MONAGHAN

Once installed in their new citadel, Currie and Co., like the green Tory brethren in the Free State, sent frequent messages "of support", and little else to their beleaguered countrymen in the North.

Readers could be forgiven for thinking that a Monaghan C.R. group might spend some of its time highlighting the problems of the thousands forced to emigrate every year from Leitrim, Monaghan and Cavan. Nothing could be further from the truth. The one condition made by Blaney and his supporters in the Free State was that there would be no criticism of the Fianna Fail semi-state.

Already the Dublin Housing Action Committee has felt the effect of this policy. On Saturday a Solidarity meeting with the North took place outside the G.P.O.

That afternoon many members of the Dublin Housing Action Committee were arrested. Those left free tried to rally support at the Solidarity meeting. The platform party looked at each other shiftily, shuffled there feet, and allowed a speech. Austin Currie however made his position clear, here was the man who made his political reputation supporting the squatters of Caledon, now he was not going to attack anyone in the South, because the North needed all the

help it could get -- even help from those he might have added who carry on the same type of exploitation in the South as the Unionists in the North.

Eamonn McCann, the Derry Young Socialist was the only speaker to take up the issue of the Dublin squatters, and to make it clear that they were fighting the same fight in the 26-Counties that the

people of Derry were fighting in the North.

We do the Paisleyites the favour of distinguishing between their brand of evangelical protestantism and ecumenical protestantism. Surely their "scholars" could note the simple difference between Russian style communism and socialism.

Now let us sort out their confusion over the role of socialists and the Catholic Church. Paisleyites will dispute that the Falls area, and the Ardoyne area were brutally attacked on the nights of August 14th, 15th and 16th, in our view they were. When people are being burned out of their homes we will fight side by side with anyone to defend those homes. So long as there is a danger of those atrocities being repeated we will work in alliance with all those working to protect the people in danger.

When peace prevails there is no weeks ago Father Murphy was instrumental in getting the barricades removed in "Free Belfast", and at work behind the barricades. This surely destroys the Paisleyite myth that the socialists and the church are working hand in hand. In fact Father Murphy rated two editorials worth of praise in the Belfast Newsletter within a week.

No-one should be suprised that socialists and the church tend to disagree when there is peace. The Catholic Church has usually resolutely kind in Ireland. It even condemned an irresistable force. Connolly and th the 1916 rebellion were subjected to often condemned for "popery" by Paisley were almost invariably excom municated for their activities.

Finally as a lesson in the game of guilt by association so often played by the Paisleyites, let us consider the following; When William of Orange won the Battle of the Boyne he was in alliance with the Pope, when the news reached Rome a celebration mass was said. A true story if embarassing to both sides, but William was involved in continental intrigue, and for him Ireland was just a sideshow.
