Northern Ireland is approaching its 100th birthday, an anniversary many thought it would never see. The bulk of our first century has seen us either in actual conflict or arguing over our constitutional status. The next 100 years need not be the same.

Unionists want to live in harmony with their nationalist neighbours. They want to grow our economy and share prosperity. They want the next generation to live in better times.

Though Northern Ireland has been without a devolved government for over a year, the many and complex reasons behind its collapse can and will be resolved. I am determined to ensure that is the case in the time ahead

I want to see Stormont return, not just to help deal with the issues like our exit from the EU, but also to build the society that has eluded us for too long, and is best achieved as part of the United Kingdom, with the safety, stability, security and success that provides.
