DONLON FROM AMBASSADOR ! SAW DOUGLAS JANES THIS MORNING. THE FOLLOWING ARE THE MAIN POINTS THAT EMERGED: (1)THE WEDNESDAY MEETING IN DOWNING STREET WAS ON THE INITIATIVE OF THE PRIME MINISTER. IT HAD BEEN ON THE MAT FOR SOME DAYS AND THE PURPOSE UNDERLYING IT IN THE PRIME MINISTER'S MIND WAS TO APPEAL TO MRS THATCHER TO ENSURE THE UTMOST DISCRETION BY HER COLLEAGUES IN THEIR PUBLIC UTTERANCES AT THIS SENSITIVE TIME IN THE NORTHERN IRELAND SITUATION. THERE WAS CONCERN IN GOVERNMENT CIRCLES ABOUT SOME RECENT STATEMENTS MAILY BY AIREY NEAVE. AS THERE WAS SOME EVIDENCE OF LOBBYING OF TORIES BY MEMBERS OF THE UUUC EARLY THIS WEEK, THE PRIME MINISTER FELT ON MONDAY THAT NO TIME SHOULD BE LOST IN HAVING THE MEETING. A LESS PRESSING REASON FOR THE MEETING WAS THE DESIRABILITY OF FILLING MRS THATCHER IN BEFORE HER VISIT TO THE USA. THERE IS NO DOUBT THAT PAISLEY MADE A PERSONAL BID FOR POWER. IN THIS HE HAS BEEN CLUMSY AND HAS SHOWN BAD THE GOVERNMENT WOULD CERTAINLY NOT WISH TO SEE JUDGMENT. HIM COMING OUT ON TOP AS HIS PUBLIC ATTITUDE IS INVARIABLY IN PRIVATE HEE CAN BE QUITE DIFFERENT. DESTRUCTIVE. (3)CRAIG'S LETTER WAS STATESMANLIKE. WHILE THE SITUATION REGARDING THE CONVENTION IS NOW CONFUSED THERE COULD BE INTERESTING DEVELOPMENTS BEFORE THE MEETING NEXT WEEK. A LOT OF INTENSIVE LOBBYING WILL BE GOING ON IN BELFAST OVER THE WEEK-END. THERE COULD BE SOME INTERESTING RALLYING OF SUPPORT FOR CRAIG.

- (4) IF.THE CONVENTION IS TO END SOON THIS DOES NOT MEAN THAT THE GOVERNMENT WILL BE PRODUCING ANY IDEAS OF ITS OWN QUICKLY. NORMALLY THE REPORT OF THE CONVENTION WOULD HAVE TO BE AWAITED AND A REACTION SHOULD COME ONLY AFTER THE REPORT HAD BEEN CONSIDERED. HOWEVER, THE DEBATE ON THE REPORT IN THE CONVENTION MAY CREATE A SITUATION IN WHICH THE GOVERNMENT MAY BE FORCED TO SHOW ITS HAND MORE QUICKLY.
- (6) REES HAD DEFINITELY PLANNED TO TAKE SOME LEAVE THIS WEEK AS HE HAS URGENT CONSTITUENCY MATTERS TO ATTEND TO.
- (7) JIM CALLAGHAN HAS BEEN BRIEFED FOR A TALK WITH THE MINISTER IN VENICE. IN A THROW AWAY REMARK JANES THOUGHT THE REQUEST FOR A MEETING WITH HIM CALLAGHAN AND REES TOGETHER A BIT STRANGE. REES MAY NOT READILY AGREE TO THIS.

- (8) I CALLED JAMES'S ATTENDION TO THE INSERTIONS IN COMBAT ABOUT WHICH JOHN MC COLGAN WROTE TO ME. THESE HAD BEENMENTIONED TO THE SECRETARY OF STATE BY THE SDLP ABOUT TEN DAYS AGO. ENQUIRIES WHICH HAVE BEEN MADE SINCE LEAD TO THE CONCLUSION THAT THE INSERTIONS WERE BOGUS. RIP for VOR here halled in
- (9) THE SECRETARY OF STATE FOR DEFENCE HAS AUTHORISED THE SOLICITORS TO PROCEED WITH THE NEGOTIATION OF A SETTLEMENT IN THE MC ELHONE CASE.
- (10) AFTER THE CONVENTION MEETING NEXT WEEK IT SHOULD BE POSSIBLE TO SEE MORE CLEARLY WHAT THE FUTURE POSITION IS LIKELY TO BE
