The Taoiseach spoke by phone today to the Prime Minister at approximately 1.05 pm.

He started by conveying sympathy on the Enniskillen bombing, adding that it was horrifying in its magnitude. He mentioned that Neil Kinnock was coming to see him later in the day and enquired as to whether he was bringing any messages from the Prime Minister. The answer was apparently in the negative.

The Taoiseach then went on to say that he was hoping to be able to steer the Extradition Bill through here. He would just ask the Prime Minister to be patient for a little longer. He was asking the Attorney General to go to London to talk about procedural aspects. He did not think that these would cause any problems but simply wanted to get things sorted out so as to facilitate matters.

The Prime Minister apparently welcomed the news and said that she would use the phrase she had already used about events, in their own way, leading to decisions.

The call, which was on an open line then concluded, with the Taoiseach saying that he would be getting to the Prime Minister more information on the plans he had in mind.

The conversation was cordial.
