Dear Chairman Elleman-Jensen:

The problem of violence and strife in Northern Ireland is well known to us all. The world has watched the death and destruction there over the last number of years with a feeling of helplessness, a sense that there was nothing positive that could be done to bring peace closer to hand.

In 1985, the governments of Ireland and the United Kingdom reached agreement on a framework within which there is potential for co-operation and development that may in time lead to peace. This settlement, the Anglo-Irish Accord, was welcomed and applauded by people all over the world. The European Communities joined in the praise of this agreement.

A key part of the Accord was the setting-up of the International Fund for Ireland. From this Fund monies would be allocated to projects with a cross-border or cross-community dimension, or to projects that involve social redevelopment. The Fund has at its disposal the sum of fifty-four million pounds sterling, made up of contributions from the United States, Canada and New Zealand.

The importance of the Fund is obvious. It has at its disposal an amount of money to direct at projects that might otherwise not receive any funding, or might fail on account of underfunding. Northern Ireland is an area of special concern to the European Communities. Grants are made available through the European Social and Regional Funds. However, the Communities have not taken the next logical step, the backing of the International Fund. The International Fund recognizes that community and economic redevelopment is an essential part of the political reconstruction of Northern Ireland. Its work has a political underpinning, the expectation of a peaceful, political solution to this problem.

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while the members of the Friends of Ireland in the U.S. House of Representatives appreciate the support given the Agreement to date by the European Communities, there is a need to develop the INTERNATIONAL dimension of the Fund. To be truly international in character the Fund must involve more than three donor-nations. The E.E.C. is needed as a donor to the Fund.

The Friends of Ireland look forward to the taking of action by the Communities on this question. The Northern Ireland conflict is a European problem. The European Communities share responsibility to assist in the endeavors of the Fund. There must be an European input into the resolution of the problem.

The Fund's credibility and effectiveness will be greatly enhanced by the participation of the Communities. We urge you to take this matter up at the next meeting of the Council of Ministers, where we are convinced that the idea will receive wide-spread support.
