Dear Secretary Hurd:

We are writing to urge the British government to permit Mr. Martin Galvin of New York to lead a delegation of more than 100 American citizens from some 28 states who are scheduled to visit Northern Ireland from approximately August 5-13.

We are aware of the fact that in August of last year, the British government issued an order which barred Mr. Galvin from making a similar visit. That decision we view as being inimical to the Democratic principles of free speech and travel. It is also hostile to efforts to promote a full and open dialogue on Northern Ireland by concerned Americans.

We are aware of the fact that Martin Galvin did ultimately enter Northern Ireland against your government's order. We also recall that when Mr. Galvin did appear in Belfast to speak at a rally of supporters, a police action ensued during which one civilian was killed and scores were injured; this, despite the peaceful nature of the crowd and the expectation by Mr. Galvin that he would be arrested for his actions.

We are also reminded of statements made by British government officials questioning the order barring Mr. Galvin in light of the unfortunate developments of August 12.

We believe that Mr. Galvin should be permitted to lead the American delegation. Our position in support of Mr. Galvin's ability to travel to Northern Ireland in no way represents our acceptance of any particular policy of Mr. Galvin or Irish Northern Aid. Rather, it is a reflection of our support of all interested and concerned Americans who wish to travel freely to and from Northern Ireland should be able to do so without selective exclusionary policies being imposed by the British government.
