MACBRIDE CAMPAIGN: LETTER OF THANKS

You also asked whether Sir Antony Acland was still Ambassador to the US. Sir Antony will remain in post until late May or early June when he will be replaced by Robin Renwick, formerly in South Africa and therefore likely to be experienced in the effects of the Sullivan Campaign, which should be useful for tackling MacBride.
