The Human Cost of War: quilt & arpillera exhibition

One of the most effective ways of informing people about the suffering and damage caused by war, violence and repressive regimes, is by using the arts, particularly images. For this reason the Movement for the Abolition of War (MAW) is hosting an exhibition in London called "The Human Cost of War". It features 22 quilts and arpilleras (South American textile pictures), all made by women of different nationalities in response to violence and conflict, and often as a form of therapy, helping them to share their memories and hurt when words have failed them.

The preview of the exhibition will be at the Imperial War Museum (London) on Remembrance Sunday, 8 November. The curator Roberta Bacic is an international expert on quilts and their relationship to conflict, and has been responsible for several exhibitions around the world. She will be talking and answering questions during the day (and will be available for press interviews).

The lead quilt is *Executed at Dawn*. This was made by Irene MacWilliam after she learned about the 306 soldiers who were shot for 'cowardice' in the First World War. Janet Booth, whose grandfather Harry Farr was one of those men, and who led the successful campaign to obtain a pardon for all those shot, will also be speaking.

The exhibition will be at the St Ethelburga's Centre for Reconciliation and Peace, Bishopsgate, from 18-21 November (<u>www.stethelburgas.org</u>). On the opening day Professor Sir Robert Hinde (MAW and Pugwash) will speak on "Ending War", and Roberta Bacic will also be there. The day will end with music and poetry. As there are several arpilleras from Chile and Peru, illustrating the actions women took part in against the military dictatorships, the music and poetry will tend to have a South American flavour.

Local schools will be visiting the exhibition on Thursday, and on Friday, as several of the quilts come from Northern Ireland, there will be a seminar on the Northern Ireland 'Troubles'. On Saturday, while the main exhibition stays at St Ethelburga's, Spanish quilts will go to the Whitechapel Gallery (<u>www.whitechapelgallery.org</u>) as part of an afternoon debate on the Spanish Civil War, and the event will itself form part of "The Nature of the Beast" exhibition by the Polish artist Goshka Macuga, on show in Gallery 2.

To close this series of events, on the Saturday evening there will be a concert of Chilean music at St Ethelburga's. Further details are available on the MAW website <u>www.abolishwar.org.uk</u>
